

Graduation Requirements

- Provincial Diploma = 30 credits from High School
- <u>Vocational Diploma</u> = 30 credits, including specific vocational program requirements
- French Immersion Diploma = 30 credits from High School, including 14 in the French Immersion Program
- Provincial Diploma with Distinction = 32 credits
- The focus should be on doing well in a manageable load. Be careful not to overload with the number of courses taken (applicable to Gr. 11&12).

Choosing Courses

Important Information:

- The number of sections of each class are decided by student selections
- Let a PCI team member know if you cannot afford the fee for a course
- ► It is important to make informed choices as you cannot change courses easily after the timetables are made
- Reasons to change your timetable:
 - You have a course you did not choose
 - Most of your courses that have a lot of homework are in the same semester
 - You have a spare (this is not allowed in Grade 9)

Credits from Outside Activities

Eligible to be Used Toward Graduation:

Royal Winnipeg Ballet (RWB):

You can obtain credits if you are registered in the senior levels of the RWB professional program.

Special Language Credit Option:

You can earn credits for mastery of a language other than English or French. This includes the American Sign Language credits. Special examinations are required.

Not Eligible to be Used Toward Graduation:

Private Music Option:

You can acquire music credits if you complete examinations with the Conservatory Canada or The Royal Conservatory of Music programs. However, these credits cannot be included among the 30 credits required for high school graduation.

Cadets:

Participation in the Cadet program allows you to acquire a maximum of two credits. However, these credits cannot be included among the 30 credits required for high school graduation.

See Guidance Department if you feel you may qualify for any of these credits. Specific documentation will be required.



Credits for Employment

If you have earned a Career Development course credit, which is taken in Grade 9 at PCI, then you have successfully unlocked future credit options once you turn 16.

Earn while you learn

Earn up to 2 credits towards high school graduation

110 hours of employment equals a high school credit

Hours can be earned outside of the school day

To register to earn Credits For Employment, connect with Mr. Hordeski

High School Apprenticeship Program

- Opportunity to earn while you learn
- Receive up to 8 credits towards high school graduation
- All credits are at the Grade 12 level
- Also earn "real-deal" apprenticeship hours towards a certified trade
- ► Flexible Hours can be earned outside of the school day

Basic Criteria:

- Minimum of 16 years of age to participate
- Employment in a recognized trade (more than 50 possibilities)



Community Career Credits:

- PCI/Red River College Health Care Aide Partnership This course, offered second semester to graduating Grade 12 students, allows students to gain valuable experience in the field of health care. Students attend Red River College where they not only receive Health Care Aide training, but also get to apply their learning in a work experience practicum. Students earn five 40S credits towards high school graduation as well as Health Care Aide Certification.
- Indigenous Health High School Internship Program This program allows Indigenous students an opportunity to gain experience in the field of health care. During Phase 1, students earn a ½ High School Internship Program credit. During Phase 2, students earn summer employment and 2 CFE credits. This program runs during second semester.

Volunteer Credit

Volunteering in our community can help you earn a high school credit toward graduation:

- One volunteer credit can be earned during your time in high school & students have the option of working towards a half or full credit.
- Students must register and be approved by Ms. Bousquet in the Career Centre prior to starting the credit at PCI.
- The volunteer credit must have a supervisor that can sign for the hours.
- ► The hours can begin at any point in the school year and can carry over to other years in school.
- Check out volunteering options in the Career Centre

55 hours = $\frac{1}{2}$ credit

110 hours = full credit

Culture Exploration Credit

Learn about a culture through community members and cultural organizations:

- One culture credit can be earned during your time in high school & students have the option of working towards a half or full credit.
- Students must register and be approved by Ms. Bousquet at the Career Centre **prior** to starting the culture credit at PCI.
- The culture credit must have a supervisor that can sign for the hours.
- The hours can begin at any point in the school year and can carry over to other years in school.

55 hours = $\frac{1}{2}$ credit

110 hours = full credit

Post-Secondary Preparation

- It's very important to keep options open!
- Even if you are not sure if you will go on to college or university, you should take time to reflect now on possible career choices for your future.
- Many courses have pre-requisites. These pre-requisite courses require planning!

NOTE: Not all 40S courses meet the entrance requirements so it is important to check with Ms Bousquet in the Career Centre!

- Graduate from PCI with a minimum of 5 credits at the 40S level
- (Must include English 40S, Math 40S, 2 academic 40S courses)
- Meet average requirement. (See Ms Bousquet about Vocational Credits)

University of Winnipeg

- Graduate from PCI with a minimum of 5 credits at the 40S level
- Meet average requirement



When Will Timetables Be Ready?

- Timetables are typically ready to be emailed to parents and students in June, and/or delivered to the feeder schools. More information will be shared in late May through your grade level Google Classroom regarding when and how to access your timetable for next year.
- If you require course changes after you receive your timetable, you will need to fill out a Course Change Form and submit it to your counsellor. This can be done online through the PCI website.

Grade 9 Phone Policy

- Students are encouraged to leave their devices at home. If students choose to bring their device it should be placed in a locked locker, their backpack, or the teacher's bucket, with the ringer on silent.
- If you wish to utilize a locker, please bring a lock with you, pick out a locker with your homeroom teacher, and then please provide a copy of the key or code to the office. Students may choose to hand their devices into the office.

- Students will be allowed to come to the office to send a message or make a phone call to a parent/guardian, as needed. If you need to speak to your child or leave a message, please call the office, at 204-857-6843. Students will have access to their phones during their 5-minute breaks and their lunch hour but are encouraged to use their devices responsibly.
- Any issues that stem from improper device use may result in having device privileges removed and/or result in an out-of-school suspension.
- Portage Collegiate is not liable for any lost, stolen, or damaged student electronic equipment brought to school.

Rationale

We ask for your support in our efforts to restrict cell phone use at school, as students are having difficulty accepting the boundaries set by their teachers. Students' privacy rights are being violated with classmates taking photos, videos, and posting, or sharing photos immediately or weeks later via social media platforms. During class time, students are accessing social media sites, and receive messages from friends and family. These incidents are interrupting the learning of our students.

Bullying issues that are often seen at school are often tied to device use on social media and in unsupervised "chats."


